



*Iowa's Community Colleges: Working Together for the Future of Iowa*

Adult Education and Literacy (AEL) is a program dedicated to putting individuals on a career pathway leading to living-wage employment. Funded annually through Iowa Skilled Worker and Job Creation Fund and Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act Title II allocations, AEL serves individuals who are at least 16 years of age, no longer in school, and have academic and workforce skill needs. AEL providers assist individuals to become proficient in reading, writing, English language, civics education; and to gain the knowledge, skills, and abilities necessary to acquire a high school credential, employment, or post-secondary education and training.





## AEL Supported Activities and Outcomes



A Measurable Skill Gain (MSG) demonstrates participants' progress toward achieving a credential or employment and is a federally measured outcome. Of the 11,247 participants in 2018, 47.6 percent achieved a MSG.

## Testimonials

**Sara**, a 26-year-old, had only completed through the 8th grade in a homeschool setting. She struggled with math, in general, and didn't have experience with some of the higher-level math such as algebra, in particular. Sara needed a high school diploma to progress with her career goals, so she enrolled in North Iowa Area Community College's program in Charles City, Iowa in January 2017. Through her participation in NIACC's program, Sara raised her math level from 1<sup>st</sup> grade to 5<sup>th</sup> grade in three months. After two more months of study, Sara successfully passed the HiSET® exam and earned her high school equivalency diploma in May 2017. After completing her diploma, Sara enrolled in a CNA course and is planning to find employment at a long-term care facility in her area.

**Winifred**, a refugee from Cameroon, came to America seeking a better life. Although she was an early childhood teacher in her country, her education and experience were not recognized in America, so she entered AEL to earn her high school equivalency diploma. Winnie took classes in math, social studies, science, reading, and writing. "Because she left all of her family behind in Cameroon, we tried to become a surrogate family for her and encouraged her to keep working toward her goal," shared Ashleigh Richmond, Program Coordinator at the Community Education Center. Winnie earned her high school equivalency diploma and is currently preparing to enroll in a social work program at Indian Hills Community College.
