Human trafficking is modern day slavery. Traffickers use force, fraud and coercion to control their victims. Any minor engaged in commercial sex is a victim of human trafficking. Trafficking can occur in many locations, near and far, in our own neighborhoods, and even on our school buses. Members of the bus industry are in a unique position to spot potential human trafficking situations and to save a life. If a situation doesn't quite look right or if one of your students suddenly has a drastic personality change, it could indicate a human trafficking situation. Keep in mind that approaching potential traffickers and their victims is dangerous, but could also lead to problems in the eventual prosecution of the traffickers.
